EDUCATIONAL HEALTH CARE PLAN POLICY

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Rationale

Ratcliffe College aims to identify Special Educational Needs and respond to enable students to make good progress and achieve their potential. This includes, where appropriate, children with EHC Plans. In so doing, we help to nurture their sense of dignity and self-worth in accordance with the School's Mission Statement. This policy has been formulated with regard to the 2014 SEN Code of Practice: 0 to 25 Years, the Equality Act 2010 and the Children and Families Act 2014. If a child

Definition of Special Educational Needs:

'A person has SEN if they have a learning difficulty or disability which calls for special educational provision to be made for him or her. At compulsory school age this means he or she has a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others the same age, or, has a disability which prevents or hinders him or her from making use of facilities of a kind generally provided for others of the same age in mainstream schools.'

Education, Health and Care Plans (EHC Plans)

An EHC plan can be put in place for children and young people up to the age of 25 who need more support than is available through special educational needs support. An EHC plan identifies educational, health and social needs and sets out the additional support needed to meet those needs.

Ratcliffe College welcomes applications for students who have Education, Health and Care Plans. On application, parents/carers are asked to provide an up to date Plan to the College along with all supporting documentation. The Headteacher and SENCo will consult to decide if the College is able to meet the student's needs. If this may be possible, or more information is needed prior to making a decision, an interview will be arranged with the Headteacher and the SENDCo, to discuss the support that may be offered to meet the child's needs and outcomes.

Further to a meeting with a family, a decision on an offer of a place will be made. This would depend on the outcome of Entrance examinations and school reports as set out in the **Admissions Policy**.

Where a Local Authority (LA) agrees to place a student into an Independent School and the school is named in Section I of the Plan, the LA retains legal and financial responsibility for ensuring that the provision specified in the child's EHC plan is made.

A final decision can only be made once the LA has consulted with the College and sufficient funding to meet the provision in Section F has been agreed.

It should be noted that an Independent School cannot be named in Section I of an EHC Plan without the School's agreement, i.e., the formal offer of a place.

EHC plans must be reviewed by the Local Authority every 12 months as a minimum and must focus on progress towards outcomes specified in the EHC Plan. The School will work with the Local Authority to ensure relevant reviews of EHC Plans are carried out as required.

How the policy is monitored.

The Assistant Head (Academic) and the SENCO are responsible for monitoring the implementation of the policy.
