

# A SNOWDONIAN EXPERIENCE

Year 13 Geography students completed an enjoyable and successful field course (between Friday 6th and Monday 9th October), based at Rhyd-y-Creuau Field Studies Centre near Betws-y-Coed where they investigated glacial processes and the water and carbon cycles.

Friday afternoon consisted of a visit to Cwm Idwal to gain an appreciation for upland glacial landscapes before their first full investigation on Saturday, exploring lowland glacial landscapes and conducting till analysis on the coast. Sunday's investigation focused on carbon storage, with the students collecting data in a peat bog high on the Welsh moors before visiting woodland to conduct surveys of carbon storage in trees.



Monday morning allowed students to develop data collection skills based on the water cycle. The students worked very hard and developed their fieldwork and analytical skills, working well as a team and collecting useful data. Mr Lambert, Mr Dziemianko and Mrs Arnold were all impressed by the positive work ethic and attitude of the students in all weather!
