#### DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

The building work on the new Fitness Suite remains on-track to be completed in the week after February half-term 2019. Ground has been broken on the site of the second Sports Hall, adjacent to the Preparatory School and, if all goes to plan, is due to be completed for October half-term 2019. We are eagerly awaiting the arrival of the fountain which will sit proudly in the Lockhart Garden and provide a beautiful focal point at the very heart of the Senior School, providing a fitting symmetry with the Preparatory School Square. The final pieces of furniture are due to arrive at the beginning of January. Once everything is installed, we shall consider a date in the Summer Term for a blessing and official opening.

#### PREPARATIONS FOR PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS

A s we approach Christmas, the summer Public Examinations may seem a long way off. However, it is essential that all candidates prepare as thoroughly as possible, taking the long-term view and maintaining a sustained effort; it is very much a marathon and not a sprint. In particular, I would wish to encourage Year 12 students to prepare thoroughly over the holiday period for their internal assessments (commencing on 21st January) and Year 13 students to make full use of their mock examinations after halfterm (commencing on 25th February), to maintain their momentum. They can do this not only by undertaking thorough revision, but also by completing set examination style questions to help them to hone their examination technique.

**F** ollowing their mock examinations, it is absolutely critical that Year 11 continue to keep the momentum going with their work in the New Year. Now is the time to make the sacrifices necessary for examination success in the summer. Therefore, I encourage Year 11 to use some of their holiday to review files and exercise books to ensure that there are no gaps in their notes, while also making lists of topics that may require further clarification on or help with from their teachers. On their return in January, students can seek appropriate support.
