#### SENIOR MATHEMATICS CHALLENGE

In this year's Senior Mathematics Challenge, there were 80,000 entries from nearly 2,200 schools. The Senior Kangaroo is one of the follow-on rounds for the Senior Mathematical Challenge, and this year, the top 4,000 pupils were invited to take part from 1,017 schools.

The Senior Kangaroo is a one-hour paper consisting of 20 questions for the best school-aged mathematicians from across Europe and beyond. Merit certificates are awarded to the top 25% of students.
