The Easter holiday provided many Senior School students with the opportunity to enjoy some fantastic residential trips. Fifty students participated in the ski trip to Colorado and over 40 students took part in the language homestay visits to Montpellier and Valencia. The CCF contingent enjoyed a weeklong camp in Holston and the Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award participants withstood the wind and rain in the Brecon Beacons to complete their practice expedition. The teaching staff enjoyed inspirational mind set training as part of our INSET day preparations last week. As you are aware, the College vision statement, Strength of Mind, Strength of Values, Strength of Purpose, draws upon the importance of educating our students to adopt a 'growth mind set' rather than a fixed mind set.

In order to help young people to persevere with their learning, particularly when challenged with tasks of increasing difficulty, this is an essential skill, aligned to developing resilience and the ability to cope with setbacks in all aspects of their lives. The College will continue to develop its teaching and learning strategies in the future to ensure that we help our students adopt a 'not yet' rather than 'can't do' attitude to their

learning. We will be announcing dates for Parent Cafés on a similar theme in the Autumn Term, so that parents can help support this approach at home too.

The final pieces of equipment are being installed in the Fitness Suite and we hope to have this outstanding new facility open to the students on Monday 13th May. Our PE staff will receive their induction training next week and will then be able to supervise students safely. This new facility is breath taking in the scope and quality of provision. We are delighted and excited that, through the generosity of so many benefactors, we are able to provide our students with this facility and the benefits it will bring to their health and fitness. Once the facility is open, we will provide opportunities for parents to come and tour the gym and associated rooms.

On a similar theme, building work on the second sports hall continues apace. The brickwork is now rising quickly on all sides following the successful pouring of the concrete floor over Easter. Mr Falconbridge can barely contain his excitement!

There are only three weeks before the May half-term holiday due to the unusually long Spring Term this year. Despite the brevity of this half-term, there is a great deal to look forward to and I hope to meet many of you on the touchline over the weekend (weather permitting) as we support the students enjoying their summer sports.






Year 4 Passion Play



As expected, the standard was high with the top four teams in the country at Tier 2 competing for the honour of being National Champions.
