COVID-19 (Coronavirus): Visitor Policy

In response to the global Coronavirus outbreak, Ratcliffe College has implemented a strict visitor policy to safeguard the health and wellbeing of the whole school community.

Our policy has been developed in accordance with the advice and guidance given by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO), Public Health England (PHE), the Boarding Schools' Association (BSA) and the Medical Officer of Schools' Association (MOSA), supported by our in-house medical team.

Where possible, all non-essential face-to-face meetings should take place online and parents should not come into school unless there is an emergency.

The current guidance is as follows:

- If you live alone and you have symptoms of coronavirus illness (COVID-19), however mild, stay at home for 10 days from when your symptoms started.
- Do not go to a GP surgery, pharmacy or hospital unless it is an emergency.
- In an emergency, dial 999.
- Book a test as soon as possible. To do this, visit the NHS website or call 119.
- If you can, tell the people you have been close to over the last 2 days that you have coronavirus symptoms.
- If you live with others and you or one of them have symptoms of coronavirus, then all household members must stay at home and not leave the house for 14 days. The 14-day period starts from the day when the first person in the house became ill.
- Medical advice tells us that Covid-19 has a fourteen-day period in which a potential risk-carrier (whether symptomatic or not) can spread the virus.
- With that contagion period in mind, a person travelling from a high-risk country, as defined by PHE, must self-isolate for fourteen days.
- If another person (student or staff) comes into *direct contact* with a potential risk-carrier during that fourteen-day period and is symptomatic, they, too, must self-isolate for fourteen days from the first day of contact and contact NHS111.

Therefore, to protect the school community, we would ask anyone who meets the following criteria not to visit the School until they have completed the specified self-isolation period and remained symptom-free.

The symptoms of coronavirus are:

- a new, continuous cough and/or
- a high temperature and/or
- a loss of, or change to, your sense of smell or taste

But these symptoms do not necessarily mean you have the illness. The symptoms are similar to other illnesses that are much more common, such as colds and flu.

Please do not visit the School if you have any of the above symptoms or you live with others and you or one of them have symptoms of coronavirus.

If you fulfil either of these criteria, you must:

- Self-isolate for 14 days.
- Be symptom-free during this period before visiting the School.

Given the close-knit environment in our school and boarding houses where viruses can be transmitted easily, our policy on self-isolation goes above and beyond the minimum standards of care, as our number one priority is to safeguard the health and wellbeing of our students, staff and the wider school community.

We will continue to monitor the coronavirus outbreak and assess the associated risks carefully. This is fast-changing, and we will issue new information as appropriate.

Visitors to the School

If you are asymptomatic, you may visit the school if you have an appointment with a member of staff only.

All parents, current and prospective, as well as visitors to the School are politely reminded to follow the guidance below:

1. Parents/visitors must report to Reception and wear a face covering when in the School buildings;
2. On entering the building, visitors report to reception where a COVID-19 declaration form will be completed. (see Appendix A);
3. Tradesmen/contractors must report to their Ratcliffe College contact at a pre-arranged meeting point where the same procedure as set out in points 1 and 2 above must be followed;
4. A member of staff meeting a visitor/parent should retain social distancing guidance of 2m at all times;
5. Prospective parents visiting the Headmaster will have 2 options available to them.
 - i) to meet online;
 - ii) to have a tour of the School with the Head for up to 30 minutes wearing a face covering.
6. Sixth Form students will not be asked to conduct tours in the first three weeks of term. This will be reviewed.
